**A note on Chapter 2's annual summer picnic, fall meetings:**

- **Summer Picnic.** At this time, it's still not clear if it will be safe to hold Chapter 2's Annual Summer Picnic.

Two dates have been reserved at Tumwater Historical Park: July 8 and August 12, with the hope that one of those dates would be deemed safe for the in-person gathering. If the picnic goes forward on one of those dates, Chapter 2 members will be notified. You will also receive updated information at the May 13 Membership Meeting.

On April 27, the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) relaxed some restrictions and said vaccinated people may go without a mask for certain outdoor recreation and dining activities. However, "officials still caution that crowded outdoor settings pose risks," according to an article in the April 27<sup>th</sup> edition of the Washington Post.

- **Fall Meetings.** After the summer break, Chapter 2 will resume its regular monthly meeting schedule on September 9<sup>th</sup> **in the safest way.** The chapter is prepared to continue virtual meetings, or hold "hybrid" meetings with both a virtual and in-person option at The Olympia Center -- **BUT IF AND ONLY IF** indoor meetings of that size are safe, follow all safety protocols and capacity restrictions at the center -- **and if Chapter 2 members approve.**

The guidance from RPEC's state office is still to hold no in-person meetings until further notice. "Meetings will take place virtually until such time as it is safe to meet in person," according to the May 3 RPEC Executive Director's Report that is included later in this newsletter.

The latest (April 27) CDC guidelines say that "fully vaccinated people should avoid large-sized in-person gatherings indoors, and follow any applicable local guidance restricting the size of gatherings. If they choose to participate, fully vaccinated people should wear a well-fitted mask."

The latest guidance from our Department of Health for Thurston County and other Phase 3 counties says that "indoor social gatherings with people from outside your household should not include more than 10 people." As the Washington Post reported April 27, "indoor settings have an almost 20-fold increased risk of transmission compared to outdoor ones."

These are all factors Chapter 2 must weigh before resuming in-person meetings, from an outdoor summer picnic to larger indoor General Membership and Executive Board meetings in the fall.

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### **Guide to Virtual Senior Information Fair at the Chapter 2 Meeting on May 13**

Chapter 2's popular Senior Information Fair returns – virtually – to our May 13 meeting after last year's pandemic pause. We hope this guide saves you time, so you get the most out of the Senior Information Fair.

Our special guests have prepared a lineup of brief presentations on volunteer, health, and community services that might interest you. Here is a brief rundown of our invited and confirmed speakers along with contact and other relevant information:

- **The Foundation for Working Families: “Natural Disaster and Hardship Relief Resources for Chapter 2 Members”**

*Carol Dotlich will present on behalf of the **Foundation for Working Families**, the natural disaster/hardship relief fund. Chapter 2 members are eligible for assistance and some have received grants from this program.*



We are honored to have Carol as our special guest, who is the current President of RPEC Pierce County Area Chapter 12, the District 8 Representative to the RPEC Statewide Executive Board, and she serves on the Foundation for Working Families Executive Board.

Before she retired, Carol was the statewide President of the Washington Federation of State Employees/AFSCME Council 28 (WFSE/AFSCME) during the floods in Lewis County in December 2007. That natural disaster devastated the homes, property, and lives of many Federation (and future RPEC) members. But it opened the door to a permanent helping hand for current and retired public employees in the face of tragedy and disaster.

Under Carol's leadership, WFSE/AFSCME created a temporary relief fund administered by its Members Only Benefits Committee that provided aid grants to help members get back on their feet after the floods. WFSE/AFSCME, its locals, individual members, Oregon AFSCME Council 75 and the national AFSCME headquarters contributed to the fund. The Pierce County Central Labor Council had in place the IRS-approved mechanism to legally distribute the funds. In just three months, more than \$105,000 in relief funds went out to about 50 WFSE/AFSCME families.

Carol also led the effort to make the relief fund a permanent source of help for union

families across the state (including RPEC Chapter 2 families).

In 2008, the relief fund was transplanted to an existing 501(c)(3) non-profit entity called

the Foundation for Working Families. The Foundation is still under the umbrella of Chapter 2's affiliate, the Washington State Labor Council.

According to a report Carol gave to the RPEC Leadership Conference in May 2019:

"The Foundation has responded when union members lost homes in wildfires, loss due to heavy snowfall and a myriad of other unavoidable damages statewide. The Foundation for Working Families helps members in all our affiliates. In this geographic location where earthquakes, wildfires, windstorms, floods, and snowfall are not uncommon, we must be prepared to provide immediate help to our union brothers and sisters when the need arises. To that end, we ask that our union affiliates contribute to the fund on an ongoing basis so that our response is immediate and effective and strengthens our union bonds."

### **RPEC Executive Director's Report**

**State Legislative Update:** The 2021 Legislative Session concluded on time on April 25<sup>th</sup>. The final budget preserved the PEBB Medicare Benefit, fully funded the employer contributions to the pension systems, and will enact a progressive tax on high-end capital gains for the first time ever. These achievements are due in no small part to the advocacy of retirees like you, so thank you for reaching out to your legislators. It has made a difference.

Unfortunately, the proposal to provide a one-time increase to Plan 1 retirees did not survive the budget negotiation process. This is especially frustrating given the modest nature of the increase which was capped at \$22 per month, and the fact that it was included in the house budget with unanimous support.

The RPEC Legislative Committee and Executive Board will be working with our leaders, allies, and Legislative Champions to develop strategy to move a proposal for a substantive and consistent COLA in the upcoming 2022 session.

**Monthly Post-Session Legislative Update Zoom Call:** During the post-session interim, we will have a monthly update on our Legislative priorities and activities on the first Wednesday of the month at 2:00 PM. Please join us on June 2nd for our first update. We will send an email reminder out as the date nears.

Monthly Virtual Legislative Update  
(first Wednesday of every month June-December)

The popular Zoom calls that started this legislative session proved effective. So successful, RPEC will continue them the first Wednesday of every month (June-December), 2-3 p.m., while the Legislature is out of session. In the just-concluded 2021 legislative session, these weekly calls kept us informed and engaged. They linked us LIVE with RPEC's executive director, statewide president and lobbyist for current updates, calls to action and answers to our questions and concerns. They played a big role in keeping our pension system fully funded, saving the Medicare PEBB premium subsidy and bringing needed revenue reforms to benefit overburdened retirees.
